> Notice of Motion: Councillor Crist
>
>
> That the Municipal Manger provide a detailed report surrounding the
> circumstances regarding the recent water main rupture and the resulting
> property damage at 2422 Hoskins Rd. and further that
>
> this include recommendations as to what steps will be taken so that in
> future no jurisdictional factor, as reported in the press, stands in the
> way of responding to such events in the most efficient and speedy manner,
> and further
>
> that the report include an explanation as to why the water main
> infrastructure renewal program in place for the last 15 years including
> the building up the appropriate Reserve Funds to accomplish this, has
> been abandoned as appears to be the case and that the report also include
> a detailed account detailing for what purposes the earmarked reserve
> funds set aside for that purpose have been used, and further that
> the report include a proposed program outlining the steps needed to
> replace the aging water main and drinking water delivery infrastructure
> on a fast track basis and that this include the necessary financial
> implications and sources of funding to finance such a program.
>
> Rationale:
> According to recent press reports rupture of a water main resulted in
> major damage to a residential property located at 2422 Hoskins Road.
> According to eyewitness reports the damage was accentuated by what
> appeared to be a jurisdictional matter which prevented District Fire
> Fighters, who appeared on the scene first, from shutting off the water
> thus resulting in an undue delay. This has been corroborated by several
> eyewitnesses.
> The rupture of water mains in the District occur at an increasing rate.
> This is not surprising since the infrastructure built in the fifties has a
> life expectancy of approximately 50 years, more or less, thus needing
> replacement. Infrastructure renewal is especially important since 15 % of
> all water mains still in existence carry a potential health risk while
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> 40% of all the water mains in existence are iron which must be replaced

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> as quickly as possible to prevent ruptures and/or result in the loss of
> water through leakage.
>
> The need for a costly infrastructure renewal program beginning in the mid
> to late nineties was recognized by a previous District engineer, John
> Bremner, 15 years ago and resulted in a reserve fund program to finance
> such a renewal program. It appears, however, that these funds instead of
> being spent on the intended infrastructure renewal program have, at least
> in part, been siphoned off and used for other purposes.
>
> Even during the 2001 budget deliberations Council was assured by the
> District Manger that the reserve funds could be safely accessed since they
> were in excess of what was required. Concerns expressed by Councillor
> Crist were dismissed. In some instances the Mayor would not even allow
> Councillor Crist familiar with the background, to explain motions to
> that effect. The result is that instead of carrying out an accelerated
> program of at least $ 10 million annually the District now intends to
> spend a mere $ 2,5 million on such a program annually. At this rate it
> would take 40 years to renew the infrastructure estimated to cost around
> $ 100 million in today's dollars.
>
> It is clear the that whole issue must be addressed in a more than
> "business as usual" manner since we are talking of major risks not only
> to property but also to human health and possibly life itself.
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
