Subject: A tree problem

Dear Mr. Crist,

I read your letter in Sunday's North Shore News regarding the District Tree Bylaws and wanted to bring your attention to an ongoing tree predicament that we have.

Years ago, a previous owner planter a row of hemlock trees about 4 feet from the edge of the curb. Over time, these trees grew and have been presenting a problem for years.

They hang over the road by 5 feet, causing numerous difficulties.

- 1. Children are forced to walk in the traffic lane on their way to and from school.
- 2. Cars cannot park there.
- 3. When the road cleaning truck comes along, the driver, in order to avoid damage to his mirrors, goes out around the trees, leaving debris and dirt at the curb.

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In the spring of 2001, I asked about the removal of these trees as they are on District land. We wanted to replace them with a cedar hedge. I had a reply from Mr. Mark Brown saying a certified arborist could remove the trees providing numerous conditions were met. After all permits costs, security deposits and payments were met, the bill would have been several thousand dollars.

As they were planted under the power lines, BC Hydro tops the trees every year or so. We spoke to someone at Hydro who was willing to remove the trees free of charge as they must be continually cut back and are not the type of trees that should have been planted under the lines. He then contacted the District for permission. It was denied, as the trees were not considered a safety hazard.

The only concession the District eventually made was that the trees could be pruned back to the trunk so they wouldn't hang over the road. This was unacceptable for two main reasons.

- 1. It would look very ugly
- 2. Being hemlocks, these trees have a very shallow root system. Pruning them on one side could cause them to fall over into our yard a very dangerous situation.

I am attaching two picture of the trees showing the mess left behind by the road sweeper, how they hang over the road and how Hydro has topped them. We have also had comments from our neighbours saying how unsightly they are.

I am asking for your help in resolving this situation.
