A BELATED MESSAGE FROM ERNIE CRIST;

So tomorrow June 28 is election day. It is the day when we will go and vote for people who we think will do the best job for us in Ottawa according to our own individual understanding of what is good and not so good.

What is good will largely depend on our own personal situation. Clearly if you are a senior citizen relying on a monthly pension and Medicare this issue will loom large in your consideration. Will there be a place in a senior citizen's home if we are old and can no longer look after ourselves. This will undoubtedly be going through our mind. If you are a student you will be wondering about the ever rising tuition fees while our country is in dire need of people with a higher education and not necessarily more lawyers.
