> The recent District of North Vancouver municipal by election to elect

> development interests in North Vancouver. This is notwithstanding
> that the sole Councillor who got elected is committed to community
> driven development.
> The influence of the Mayor elect who is openly committed to infilling,
 (read higher density) and the elimination of trees to make room for
> more development, notwithstanding solemn declarations to the contrary,
> and who has consistently voted against making publicly owned foreshore
> land accessible to the public, as suggested in the Waterfront Task
> Force Report, will be far stronger than the election of one new
> Councillor committed to slow growth.
> The reason this Mayoralty candidate got elected is NOT because of CUPE
> or Labour support and it is NOT because of Mountain Biker support,
> although this helped. It is because the real estate, the advertising
> and the pro development interests and their beneficiaries supported

> Nor should the people in the District hope to have their taxes
> lowered. There will be attempts to make changes on the minuscule and

> such as subsidizing the City on a grand scale and/or reorganising the
> Rec Commission to save millions of dollars, as has been suggested,
> will not come about.
> There will be additional pressures direct or indirect on the concept
> of neighbourhood and community driven development. Trees will be saved
> but only as long as they do not interfere with development. This has
> been the case in the past and will be the case in the future. A
> Leopard does not change his spots especially when it has been rewarded
> at the polls. The only difference is that it will be more so in the
> future.
> The upshot will be more traffic, more development in the name of
 'affordable housing' (leaky condos), more pollution, and more
> congestion in North Vancouver District but fewer trees to absorb the
