City Staff are recommending Ottawa phase in a ban on cosmetic pesticides for private use. The pesticide ban will include exemptions for farms, golf courses and country property. The proposal calls for the City of Ottawa to increase education on pesticides in 2006, begin issuing warnings to home owners in the first half of 2007 and hand out tickets starting on Canada Day. Councillor Diane Holmes says officers would not be assigned to hand out tickets. Bylaw Services would act on complaints from the public. A city committee will deal with the issue next Thursday. Ottawa Mayor Bob Chiarelli acknowledges there is momentum towards a ban on the use of pesticides on private property http://www.cfra.com/headlines/index.asp 12 million Canadians Live in Cities Where Health Comes First: Health Committee Chair Ottawa - Responding to the release this afternoon of a City report that proposes to phase-out the cosmetic use of pesticides, Ottawa Health Committee Chair Diane Holmes said: "12 million Canadian live

in cities where health comes first and perfect lawns come second. Ottawa won't be a leader on this issue, but that doesn't mean we can't act."

The plan, recommended by the City's Medical Officer of Health after an aggressive three-year public education campaign failed to reduce pesticide use, would limit the application of pesticides to essential uses. Agriculture, rural communities, golf courses and the treatment of infestations on lawns, like white grubs, would be exempted.

"Doctors in our community-leaders in their field, like Dr. Robin Walker from CHEO, Dr. Hartley Stern of the Regional Cancer Clinic, and Dr. Jack Kitts of the Ottawa Hospital, are telling me that we need to follow the lead of other cities to protect our kids. I, for one, can't say no to that." "This issue is a lot like seat belts use: people first felt seat-belt laws were intrusive, but within a few years nearly everyone came to see that it's just common sense." A by-law to protect public health and the environment by phasing-out the cosmetic use of pesticides CITY WIDE / ACS2005-PGM-POL-0058 That the Health, Recreation and Social Services Committee recommend Council: 1. Enact the by-law attached as Document 2 in order to protect human health and the environment by restricting the application of pesticides in the urban area to essential uses, including the following provisions: a general prohibition on cosmetic use of a) pesticides, including use on lawns; b) exceptions for agriculture, golf courses and other non-cosmetic uses; allow the treatment of infestations on lawns, C) without a permit; an effective date of January 1, 2006; d) Consider the following options if Recommendation 2. 1 is approved: require a permit for the treatment of infestations; a) refer the development of guidelines for the b) conditions under which an infestation could be treated with pesticides to an advisory panel; C) require a buffer zone when pesticides are applied in golf courses;

change the effective date to January 1, 2007. d) 3. If Recommendation 1 is not approved, consider enacting a by-law as outlined in Document 5, which regulates the use of pesticides in the urban area of the City and includes the following provisions: a) pesticide-free periods; b) signage requirements; spot application requirement; C) d) buffer zones; restrictions based on weather; e) f) treatment of infestations despite the conditions in (a) and (c), with notification; an effective date of January 1, 2006. g) 4. Approve an implementation strategy that includes the following: education of the public on the by-law in 2006; a) warnings during the first half of 2007; and b) charges as appropriate after July 1, 2007. the aged and hospital properties; and \* 65% reduction on all remaining non-residential uses, That staff be directed to prepare a by-law to be adopted by the end

of 2005; and that such a by-law would incorporate the following principles:

Applicable to all private, industrial, commercial and institutional property within the boundaries of the City of Ottawa;
