When it comes to environmental protection including the use of pesticides, herbicides etc, the Federal Government has absolutely no credibility nor (with the exception of Quebec) do Provincial Governments. This is the case both at home and abroad. Suffice it to say that Canada still allows the dumping of raw sewage into the Oceans, Rivers and Lakes.

The USA, according to the UN Health Organisation is the worlds biggest atmospheric polluter pouring, as it does 6 billion tons of toxins into the air annually, while Canada, with one tenth of the population, is on an equal footing pouring as it does 600 million tons of toxins into the air annually. This has been done repeatedly which may be one of the reasons why the Canadian corporate agenda calls for the abolition of the CBC. Suffice it to say that the government is considering allowing DDT which has been condemned by the world health organisation many years ago as one of the deadliest toxins, to be used again as an acceptable pesticide.

With this in mind and with the health problems, including cancer, growing at an alarming rate it now falls on Local Governments to rise to the occasion. \circ
