I am forwarding a copy of a letter I sent to the press at their invitation re this issue. I am doing so as a matter of courtesy. The "Strategic Study" which you have hailed as "a great asset" was so biased and so narrow as to be useless as a professional document. Where for instance is the reference to discussions, serious discussions that is, with the GVRD as was requested in the terms of reference for this report? If such a report were to be presented to the directors of a private corporation it would surely result in a reprimand of those responsible for its presentation. It is neither strategic nor comprehensive. Even so, it does mention the expenditure of \$ 970.00 for a parking lot and just for starters, which you seem to dismiss as inconsequential more or less relative to the economic benefits. \$ 970.000 and just for starters at a time when we cannot find any money to access the public waterfront or provide sidewalks to improve public safety or sufficient funding to maintain our parks. I also take issue with your contention that there are considerable economic benefits to the community. As to the issue of Mountain Biking, I can only tell you that it is a no win situation and can only bring grief and disappointment in the long run.

Allowing > Mountain Biking on our local North Shore mountains adjacent to > residential areas, without fully understanding it's environmental and > financial impact, was a mistake. > So far we have not only upset the Mountain Bikers by demolishing some > of their illegally built structures and by putting restrictions on > some of their activities, but we have also upset local residents > affected by traffic, parking, environmental not to mention fiscal > concerns. > > A moratorium until we know where Biking on our steep local mountains > will lead, is long overdue. Any delay will only lead to more problems. > We need a better understanding of what we can expect in terms of > environmental impact on our, fragile and rain soaked forest ecology. > We need to investigate whether the private sector and/or the GVRD or a > combination of both wish to accommodate this sport. We need to decide > whether we want to risk any further adverse impact on our trails, > what projects we are willing to sacrifice from our limited municipal > budget to accommodate this extreme sport and until we have come to an > agreement with the Mountain Bikers themselves on accepting > responsibility for the damage already caused on the trails so far. > > To ask District taxpayers to shoulder the financial burden, which > includes building special parking facilities in what is now a forest,

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>	additional policing, maintenance of trails and the cost of coping with increased traffic, is too big a responsibility for one municipality. Mountain Bikers of course are quick to point to the
	economic benefits accruing to the municipality from the biking
	community, but a closer examination shows different. This, in my
	opinion is an issue which is regional in nature. It is best addressed
>	by the GVRD on its own substantial lands in conjunction with the
>	private sector.
